

Missouri Economic Dashboard Data Citations

1. Unemployment Rates

Definition: The unemployment rate represents the number of unemployed as a percentage of the labor force. Labor force data are restricted to people 16 years of age and older, who currently reside in 1 of the 50 states or the District of Columbia, who do not reside in institutions, and who are not on active duty in the Armed Forces.

2. U-6 Underemployment Rate

Definition: The underemployment rate is often used to show the prevalence of people being unable to find a job that matches their skills, instead working jobs for which they are overqualified. It represents the total amount of unemployed people, plus all marginally attached workers, plus total employed part time for economic reasons, as a percent of the civilian labor force plus all marginally attached workers.

Discouraged workers are persons who are not in the labor force, want and are available for work, and had looked for a job sometime in the prior 12 months. They are not counted as unemployed because they had not searched for work in the prior 4 weeks, for the specific reason that they believed no jobs were available for them. The marginally attached are a group that includes discouraged workers. The criteria for the marginally attached are the same as for discouraged workers, with the exception that any reason could have been cited for the lack of job search in the prior 4 weeks. Persons employed part time for economic reasons are those working less than 35 hours per week who want to work full time, are available to do so, and gave an economic reason (their hours had been cut back or they were unable to find a full-time job) for working part time. These individuals are sometimes referred to as involuntary part-time workers.

3. Real Median Household Income (RMHI), 2016 CPI-U-RS Dollars

Definition: The household income level in the middle of the population's distribution. This means 50% of households make more than the median and 50% make less. "Real" indicates that the number has been adjusted for inflation to represent true purchasing power.

4. Labor Force Participation

Definition: The labor force participation rate is the percentage of the population that is either employed or unemployed and actively seeking work.

5. Consumer Price Index 12-month Percent Change

Definition: Consumer Price Index (CPI) is a measure of the average monthly change in the price for goods and services paid by urban consumers between any two time periods. The CPIs are based on prices for food, clothing, shelter, and fuels; transportation fares; service fees (e.g., water and sewer service); and sales taxes. The CPI can be used to recognize periods of inflation and deflation.

Definition: Gross Domestic Product (GDP) is the total money value of final goods and services produced in the economic territories of a country in a given year.

Definition: The vacancy rate is the percentage of all available units in a rental property, such as a hotel or apartment complex, that are vacant or unoccupied at a particular time.

The poverty visualization relays information on the 90% confidence interval (CI) of the poverty estimates. Confidence intervals allow a reader to understand the precision of an estimate. For a 90% CI a reader can be 90% confident that the true value of a metric lies somewhere within the articulated range.
